kahkiyaw niyanan ewaskawistamak Moving Forward Together – program partnerships to increase outcomes, effectiveness and efficiency

For every negative there is a positive! COVID-19 restrictions and the resulting fall out effects were a catalyst to implement a Strategic Planning process, inclusive of all departments in the Division plus others! Early in June department managers from Youth, Student Services, Early Learning, maskêkosihk nêhiyawawin, mamôwacitowin and maskêkosak kiskinomâtowikamik plus Elders, Division Leads and team members came together in person and over Zoom to plan and work together.

So that everyone could get on the same page, presentations were made on core ECN and Division operational principles such as:

- Decolonization necessary to fully support our young people
- Cultural Foundations and Pillars
- Creating a Community of Care strengthbased, holistic, Gifted Child model to recognize, value, respect and include
- Leadership/Wellness Pathways
- Integrated Arts
- Early Learning, Integrated Child Development and Family Support Centre of Excellence
- Land Based Learning growing connection to the land and all that is in, on and above it.

A presentation was done on the colonial box theory which helped everyone understand why people and departments have a tendency to work alone, in silos. The theory illustrates the suppression of indigenous knowledge and ways of knowing through globalization, religion, education and technology. These elements work against connectedness.

As a Division we will work towards the restoration of wahkohtowin and reinstating what colonization has eroded.



Some words we associate with awasisak, children

Digging deep, small groups worked together to answer questions about how each person, program and department could find ways to increase outcomes and impact for our children, youth and families. This task included identifying ways to integrate and make the best use of scarce financial resources, talented staff, community skills and knowledge, external resources, buildings, equipment and programming options.

Failing to plan is planning to fail therefore, follow up sessions were set for strategic and implementation plan development.



Land Based Instructor - Train the Trainer Camp



June 15_{th} - 19_{th} three of our Land Based Learning and youth mentorship team members took a week of Train the Trainer safety certification courses.

The courses were held at kâniyâsihk Cree Cultural Camp and were hosted by Kevin Lewis. Certificates acquired included Advanced Wilderness First Aid (Red Cross) - 40 hrs; Lake water 1 Certification (Paddle Canada) and Hiking Certification (Outdoor Council of Canada) - 14 hrs.

In the fall, Kevin who is a highly regarded Cree Culture and Language teacher, will be delivering a Land Based Learning facilitator course right at maskêkosihk. The goal is that everyone who wants to learn, share and teach about the land, will be feel confident doing so. Perhaps he will also bring his atimwak and sleds again during the winter!
